#### FROM THE CHAPLAIN'S DESK

##### The Dignity of Human Work



The first Monday of September is Labor Day. It also marks the unofficial end of summer for most. I have heard it so many times, Memorial Day marks the beginning of summer while Labor Day marks its end. By this time, many have gone on vacation and have taken their summer breaks to be with family and friends and have visited places of interest that are in one's bucket list. Others stay home and take time to rest and relax after months of very hard work.

Schools have started and many people are back to work after some time off. The question I heard so many times is, "Why do we have to work? Many say that we work to make a living. More than a way to making a living, work is a form of continuing participation in God's creation. There is dignity in the work that we do. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected: the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to the organization and joining of unions, to private property, and to economic initiative.

Work is the setting for rich personal growth and where many aspects of life enter into play: creativity, planning for the future, developing our talents, living out our values, relating to others, giving glory to God. It follows that, in the reality of today's global society, it is essential that "we continue to prioritize the goal of access to steady employment for everyone no matter the limited interests of business and dubious economic reasoning. Here are some Church Teachings on the Dignity of Work.

**We were created with a vocation to work.** Unfortunately, there has been so much advancement in technology that it has increasingly replaced human work. In many instances, this has been detrimental to humanity. Work is a necessity, part of the meaning of life on this earth, a path to growth, human development and personal fulfillment. Helping the poor financially must always be a provisional solution in the face of pressing needs. The broader objective should always be to allow them a dignified life through work. (Pope Francis, *On Care for Our Common Home* [[Laudato Si'](#)], nos. 127-28)

**Work requires growth in justice.** This requires more than economic growth, while presupposing such growth: it requires decisions, programs, mechanisms and processes specifically geared to a better distribution of income, the creation of sources of employment and an integral promotion of the poor which goes beyond a simple welfare mentality. I am far from proposing an irresponsible populism, but the economy can no longer turn to remedies that are a new poison, such as attempting to increase profits by reducing the work force and thereby adding to the ranks of the excluded." (Pope Francis, *The Joy of the Gospel* [[Evangelii Gaudium](#)], no. 204)

**Man, the primary capital to be safeguarded and valued and the focus and aim of all economic and social life.** "I would like to remind everyone, especially governments engaged in boosting the world's economic and social assets, that the primary capital to be safeguarded and valued is man, the human person in his or her integrity: "Man is the source, the focus and the aim of all economic and social life." (Pope Benedict XVI,

*Charity in Truth* [[Caritas in Veritate](#)], no. 25, quoting Second Vatican Council, *The Church in the Modern World* [[Gaudium et Spes](#)], no. 63)

**The economic sphere is neither ethically neutral, or inherently inhuman or opposed to society.** It is part and parcel of human activity and precisely because it is human, it must be structured and governed in an ethical manner. (Pope Benedict XVI, *Charity in Truth* [[Caritas in Veritate](#)], no. 36)

**The right to just wage and to personal security of the worker.** In many cases, poverty results from a violation of the dignity of human work, either because work opportunities are limited (through unemployment or underemployment), or "because a low value is put on work and the rights that flow from it, especially the right to a just wage and to the personal security of the worker and his or her family." (Pope Benedict XVI, *Charity in Truth* [[Caritas in Veritate](#)], no. 63)

**The obligation to earn one's bread by the sweat of one's brow also presumes the right to do so.** A society in which this right is systematically denied, in which economic policies do not allow workers to reach satisfactory levels of employment, cannot be justified from an ethical point of view, nor can that society attain social peace. (St. John Paul II, *The Hundredth Year* [*Centesimus Annus*], no. 43). All people have the right to economic initiative, to productive work, to just wages and benefits, to decent working conditions, as well as to organize and join unions or other associations. (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, *A Catholic Framework for Economic Life*, no. 5)

**Work is, as has been said, an obligation, that is to say, a duty, on the part of man. . . Man must work, both because the Creator has commanded it and because of his own humanity, which requires work in order to be maintained and developed.** Man must work out of regard for others, especially his own family, but also for the society he belongs to, the country of which he is a child, and the whole human family of which he is a member, since he is the heir to the work of generations and at the same time a sharer in building the future of those who will come after him in the succession of history. (St. John Paul II, *On Human Work* [[Laborem Exercens](#)], no. 16)

**Work is a good thing for man-a good thing for his humanity.** This is because through work man *not only transforms nature*, adapting it to his own needs, but he also *achieves fulfillment* as a human being and indeed, in a sense, becomes "more a human being." (St. John Paul II, *On Human Work* [[Laborem Exercens](#)], no. 9). All these rights, together with the need for the workers themselves to secure them, give rise to yet another right: *the right of association*, that is to form associations for the purpose of defending the vital interests of those employed in the various professions. These associations are called labor or trade unions. (St. John Paul II, *On Human Work* [[Laborem Exercens](#)], no. 20)

May we do our work very well. By sanctifying our work, it would sanctify us and sanctify others by the work that we do. May God bless us all, Amen.

## CULTURE OF LIFE NEWS

### Scarlet Letter



Some things come late in life, or more precisely, later. For me it was reading, or more precisely, the enjoyment of reading. As a kid, I'd dutifully go to the library and check out a stack of books. Two weeks later they'd go back unread, often not even opened. Today, the chance to take my mind off the day's concerns and enter a different time and place is relaxing, inspiring, and thought provoking.

With lots of catching up to do, my focus has mainly been on classic fiction, books that have stood the test of time. Like *The Scarlet Letter*, Nathaniel Hawthorne's 1850 novel about life in the Massachusetts Bay Colony of the 17th century. Hester Prynne had a pretty big problem. Hester had relations with a minister

resulting in a child. The minister would not admit his involvement, and Hester would not disclose his identity. In Puritan society adultery was unforgivable, so she was forced to wear the letter A on her clothes, a public stigma that resulted from her wrongdoing.

As societies have developed over the ages, one constant feature has been the imposition of boundaries. That's good, for boundaries are important to self-preservation. Some things we must not do. No one disputes that we may not take another's property, and certainly not take another person's life. It is universally accepted that we may not destroy another's reputation by scandalous and malicious lies. Civilized societies create laws to mark our boundaries and to give fair notice of what will happen if someone crosses over them. Disobedience has often resulted in punishment—and a resulting stigma.

Over the centuries mankind's boundaries have changed, sometimes for the good, sometimes not. But those changes have usually been gradual. There is a reason. It allows society to come to grips with what is being asked, with whether a proposed change is for the common good. It is why *Roe v. Wade* came as such a shock—there was nothing gradual about it. All of a sudden, women nationwide were told they could legally kill their own children. What had been the strongest social boundary of all crumbled before our very eyes.

*Roe's* authors, and the justices who reaffirmed *Roe* in later cases, thought that by treating abortion as just another medical procedure, it would become acceptable to society as a whole. The issue would somehow be forgotten, and everyone (but the unborn) would just move forward. But *Roe's* promise was never fulfilled, and it was evident from the beginning that it would not be. Those who saw legal abortion as the unspeakable evil never stopped working to end it. Over the years, their work intensified. In many states, common sense restrictions were imposed to protect the health and safety of women—often teens—forced to deal with the unexpected consequences of boundaries crossed.

But *Roe* was still there, and legal abortion continued nationwide. Women had abortions by the millions under a claim of right. Of course, a legal right and a moral right can be two very different things. And for many women, the abortion process was anything but liberating. Women who thought it was just a medical procedure learned the very hard way that it is not. Abortion left many women with physical, emotional and spiritual scars. It also left them with a stigma—a scarlet A for abortion—that they saw even if no one else did.

For decades, the abortion movement has tried to de-stigmatize abortion. Women have been told that an abortion is “reproductive justice” and “health care.” They've heard that they have a “right to choose”—though never specifically told what they are choosing. They hear that the new creation inside them is really only a “mass of tissue” or a “clump of cells,” words accepted in moments of desperation but not after a little thought. Recently, an activist described abortion as an act of “self-love,” which more sounds like selfishness than love. A Congresswoman suggests that we eliminate the word “abortion” because it weaponizes the procedure—though abortion is a weapon. Women are told to “shout out” their abortions and that opposition to it is just the ravings of an intolerant Church.

But all the efforts to de-stigmatize abortion have and will continue to fail for a simple reason. Long before there was Church or legal abortion, God wrote His natural law deep in mankind's heart. It speaks to us, allowing us to differentiate between good and evil, to know what is

right and wrong. It allows us to serve Him and to live with each other in harmony, even if we do not profess a religious faith. The clanging of a misguided culture cannot silence its message. It is what women who contemplate or have suffered from abortion hear in their hearts. Ironically, it is what the abortion movement, with all its claim of helping women, ignores. Did you ever hear of any abortionist providing counseling for women?

Roe may be gone, but it gave the culture a 50-year head start in bad thinking. In our post-Roe world, we must change hearts and minds. It starts with re-establishing that abortion is a serious wrong, a boundary not to be crossed. But it continues by constantly assuring that in Christ's Church, all hurt by abortion can find forgiveness, help, and hope.

No one needs to wear a scarlet A, even if no one else sees it.

*Father McGivney's vision for the program stemmed from his own life experiences*

It's no surprise that when Father Michael J. McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882, an insurance program was at the heart of his vision for the Order. The young priest, after all, knew firsthand the devastation that a lack of proper insurance planning can bring to Catholic families. We can point to several events in Father McGivney's life that undoubtedly helped shape his vision for the Knights of Columbus insurance program.

Check out these key experiences from Father McGivney's life below, and then learn how Knights of Columbus Insurance can provide financial security to you and your family today.

#### 1. Growing up in a poor and working class community

Father McGivney's parents came to the United States in the great 19th-century wave of Irish immigration and were married in Waterbury, Conn. His father, Patrick, was a molder in the heat and noxious fumes of a brass mill. His mother, Mary, gave birth to 13 children, six of whom died young, leaving Michael with four living sisters and two brothers. Life was not easy, especially for Catholic immigrant families who often faced social and financial disadvantages. As a 13-year-old, Michael began work in the spoon-making department of a brass factory to provide a few more dollars for his family.

#### 2. The death of his own father

As a young seminarian, McGivney was forced to leave his studies and return home to aid his family after the sudden death of his father. Without the breadwin-

ner's income, the family was unable to support their son financially, and he was only able to continue his studies after receiving a scholarship from the local bishop.

#### 3. Meeting other families in need

Less than a decade later, Father McGivney, then an associate pastor at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Conn., saw a familiar situation. One of his parishioners, Edward Downes, Jr., was forced to quit the seminary and return home to New Haven to support his mother and siblings after his father died unexpectedly.

In those days, the court had the right to assign children to public institutions if it had reason to believe that their families could not properly support them.

The Downes family faced the very real prospect of losing their three teenage boys unless each had a guardian to sponsor and stand for him in court, and provide \$1,500 to back the claim to guardianship.

On Feb. 6, 1882 – the very same day as the first meeting for what would become the Knights of Columbus – Father McGivney appeared in court to stand as guardian for Edward's brother Alfred. The court accepted.

#### 4. Meeting influential Catholic laymen in New Haven

Father McGivney worked closely with the New Haven's leading Catholic men, like Cornelius Driscoll, an Irish immigrant who earned both his bachelor's and law degrees at Yale and who would become the first Irish Catholic and first immigrant to be elected as mayor of New Haven. Driscoll introduced Father McGivney to another leading Catholic, James T. Mullen, who had served in the Union army during the Civil War, later becoming a policeman and, finally, a business owner. See how driven these men were, Father McGivney saw an opportunity to band together Catholic men like them.

A man of strategic vision, Father McGivney used these experiences — the struggles of growing up in a family trying to make ends meet, the death of his father, and the challenges his fellow Catholics faced — as inspiration to find a solution. Meeting driven Catholic laymen like Driscoll and Mullen no doubt helped the priest envision an Order that would bring together men of faith while securing the financial future of their families.
